To Get Started

To be part NC Innovations Waiver, you must:

- Meet the requirements for Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF-IID) level of care
- Live in an ICF-IID or be at risk of being placed in an ICF-IID
- Be able to stay safe, healthy and well in the community while using <u>NC Innovations</u>
 Waiver services
- Need and use NC Innovations Waiver services listed in your person-centered plan at least once a month
- Want to use NC Innovations Waiver services instead of living in an ICF-IID

The <u>NC Innovations Waiver</u> overs a wide array of <u>services and supports</u> intended to empower people with disabilities to live the life they choose in the community of their choice. Waiver services are administered by a <u>Local Management Entity /Managed Care Organization</u> (<u>LME/MCO</u>) which facilitates services and oversees a network of community-based service providers. Individuals who receive waiver funding work with their team to develop a <u>Personcentered Plan of Care</u> and request the <u>services and supports</u> they need to live in their home and community.

The <u>LME/MCO</u> that you should contact is usually determined by where you live. Use the <u>LME/MCO Directory</u> to determine a starting point if you are interested in seeking services and supports through the <u>NC Innovations Waiver</u>. Contact the <u>LME/MCO</u> and inform them that you are interested in being considered for <u>NC Innovations Waiver</u>.

If you are eligible, your <u>LME/MCO</u> can help you get services. There are only a certain number of NC Innovations Waiver slots. If the slots are full, your name will be added to the Registry of Unmet Need and your <u>LME/MCO</u> will review any services or community resources that may be available to you while you wait for the <u>NC Innovations Waiver</u>.
